

IT was a bold step, but it was a resounding success. There were many rave reviews in the local and Japanese press.

What was significant about KOKIJI was that it was spearheaded by a group of final year students who wanted to achieve something great for the Hall and for themselves in the cultural scene. Being in their final year, they did not need to do anything for the Hall in order to gain points for re-admission next year. So what they did was entirely out of their desire to achieve something to their personal satisfaction. Their dedicated efforts were no doubt rewarded when KOJIKI turned out to be an outstanding success. I hope all residents will take the cue from these final year Eusoffians to participate in Hall activities out of personal interest, for the Hall and not just merely for accumulating enough points to return to the Hall next year. Only then will the activity become successful.

Another significant thing about KOJIKI was that it was a large production involving 135 residents. It thus became a rally point for the Hall. Everyone helped and everyone was happy about the result.

In a sense, because of the grand scale and effort required, the annual concert this year has overshadowed the other activities. They were nonetheless memorable, and the pages of this yearbook describes them well. I must congratulat the editorial committee for their excellent work.

I would like to take this opportunity to express my gratitude to the resident fellows, SCRC, JCRC and all the members of committees who have contributed to a wonderful Hall life this year. Apart from all the successes that we have achieved, I hope that we have also enjoyed our fellowship with one another in the Eusoff family. I hope that all of you had a truely enriching year in Eusoff.

Dear Fellow Eusoffians

With the new objectives set down by the JCRC, Eusoff saw the first steps to a reduction to the overtaxation of hostel activities, followed by the radical change in the points system. New guidelines were introduced for orientation, and we have had to fight to maintain our stand in the face of NUSSU's points proposal.

Externally, the success of Kojikio has brought nationwide recognition to Eusoff as a cultural force to be reckoned with; while the campus wide forum organised by the Forum and Debating Committee and the CHR's fund raising effort for Camp Rainbow have proven that hostelites are not the insular, self concerned and campus bo-chaps they have thought us to be.

Eusoff will continue to be in a state of flux and change as long as we continue to try to achieve a better tradition for Eusoff. However, while change is good, change can also be a menace to stability. We have to reslise that when change is introduced, success is not necessarily immediate. We cannot afford to be myopic but instead should perceive things as they can be in the long run. Change for the better can only be achieved if each and every Eusoffian decide that this is what they want to do. The objectives and ideas will always be there but ultimately its success depends on you.

Many have said that university education is not complete without the experience of staying in a Hall. However, the Hall is not just a convenience as you slog for that piece of paper you will be getting after your univeristy education. I hope that you will have achieved much more than that in Eusoff. If you can believe that the world does not just consists of the 'I' but the 'Us', then you would have truly experienced Hall life and achieved a successful university education.

As we recollect our memories, let us smile at the pleasant ones and learn from the failures - those are just temporary setbacks. The success of our lives depends on what we make out of it, just like the success of Eusoff Hall is what we make out of it.

SCRC

Unlike the JCRC, members of the SCRC do not have to run elections in order to be in the committee. They are invited by the Master to join the SCRC. Most of the members have been hostellites in their university days, be it local, like Mrs Tan Chee Kiow, who is the president of Eusoff Alumni, or overseas, like A/Prof Liew Ah Choy, Deputy Head of Department of Electrical Engineering. They enjoyed hostel life very much and that is why they were more than willing to accept the invitation by the Master.

According to A/Prof Liew, who has been an SCRC member for years, the Committee meets about 5 to 6 times a year. They usually discuss policy matters and give their inputs to make Eusoff Hall a better place to live in.

Another "veteran" SCRC member, Dr Evelyn Lip, who is a lecturer from the School of Architecture and a well-known author of books on Fengshui, and who, incidentally, has never been a hostellite in her life, regretted not accepting the offer to be a Resident Fellow when approached by the Deputy Vice-Chancellor in the early 70's. When asked what were the changes she has seen through the halls in all her years of being an SCRC member, Dr Lip said there has been tremendous improvements in accommodations and the students have become more innovative and enterprising.

This view is shared by Miss Helen Oh, Head of Public Relations Department of Great Eastern Life, who is in her first year as an SCRC member. A hostellite in her salad days, she brought in her company to sponsor several Eusoff Hall events like the Dinner and Dance as well as Rag and Flag Day.



This year's camp was focused on fun rather than regimentation...



Although the Forum did not come up with a specific answer to the question of whether NUS is a right place, it generated healthy discussion and provided an avenue for all to raise their questions and opinions about the present education system.

All in all, it was an educational and enjoyable venture. VOX! hopes it will pave the way for many more such campus-level intellectual events as Eusoff continues to strive for Excellence and Harmony.
