his is our 8th year on campus. This is also the academic year in which we celebrate together with the rest of the university community, the 90th anniversary of NUS. We did so right at the beginning of the academic year in July with the launching of the Hall's Waste Recycling Project by the Minister of the Environment, Rear Admiral Teo Chee Hean. We are taking the lead among the halls of residence to implement a comprehensive waste recycling project.

Our Dinner and Dance also made history by

being the first of any university or hall organisation to have such an event overnight aboard a luxury cruise ship. The D&D committee was not intimidated with the exceptionally large amount of sponsorship that needed to be raised. Nor were they daunted by the very different venue which required a significant amount of adaptation and hard work. In the end, they were able to provide residents with a unique experience of a Cadence of the Sea.

Our annual Concert Committee once again staged another outstanding production called Happily Ever After ... A Fairy Tale Kinda Story. This year we combined charity work with

concert production and raised \$10,000 for the Lions Home for the Elders. Children from children's homes and Camp Rainbow were also treated to the colourful and delightful performance during the Charity Premiere.

A new Merit Award has also been introduced called the Academic Excellence Award which recognises those residents who have achieved academic honours and at the same time made significant contributions to the Hall. For the first time also, the Merit Award Dinner was held together with a Eusoff Alumni Reunion Dinner. We hope that this will evolve in to a regular annual affair providing more interaction between Alumni, fellows

and residents.

Some major renovations have been carried out during the year. A new canopy has been constructed over the driveway at the front of the Hall. Besides enhancing the frontage of the Hall, it provides great convenience for our residents, visitors and VIP guests during inclement weather. A covered walkway between block E and the Hall internal bus-stop has been constructed. The games room has been partitioned into 3 air-conditioned rooms, namely the dance room, gym and billiards room. All drying room in the blocks have

been covered and fenced up to provide better security. A new fitness corner is being developed near the multi-purpose court. These renovations should make the Hall a more conducive place to live in.

As I read through the valedictory articles of this yearbook, the common theme which surface again and again was the bond of friendship which our residents have formed during their stay in the Hall. Bonds of friendship which were formed through orientation, through the toil of committee work, through the sweat of training and matched, through leisurely suppers and late night discourses, through the sharing of fears, frustrations and joys, through living to-

gether as one big family which is Eusoff Hall. It encourages me to know that our efforts to promote communal living in the Hall have not been in vain. I am glad that many of you have cherished your years in the Hall. I hope that those of you who are leaving the Hall will continue to keep in touch with fellow Eusoffians particularly through the Eusoff Alumni.

Once again, I wish to congratulate the Yearbook Committee under the able leadership of Rodney Ee for an excellent production. I also wish to thank all the members of the JCRC and SCRC for their support and contribution to make this another great year for the Hall.



When I look at the faces around me, I see changes. The strange, fresh faces I saw during chat time have become familiar and some of these, have become close friends. This is what living in the hall is all about. At the end of the year, you have gotten to know someone new, you have experienced something new, you have learnt something new about yourself - you have grown.

The Hall has also grown during the past year. This year has been a year of firsts and improvements. We enjoyed a first-ever Dinner and Dance held on a cruise, we had a Concert Production that ran three shows and raised \$10,000 for charity and we had better placing for most of our IHG sports. champion. Indeed, the most eagerly anticipated event for the night was well received by the residents who, initially all seated, slowly started crowding excitedly round the competition table

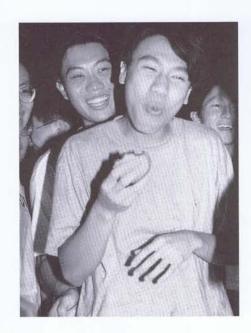

NEW YEAR DINNER

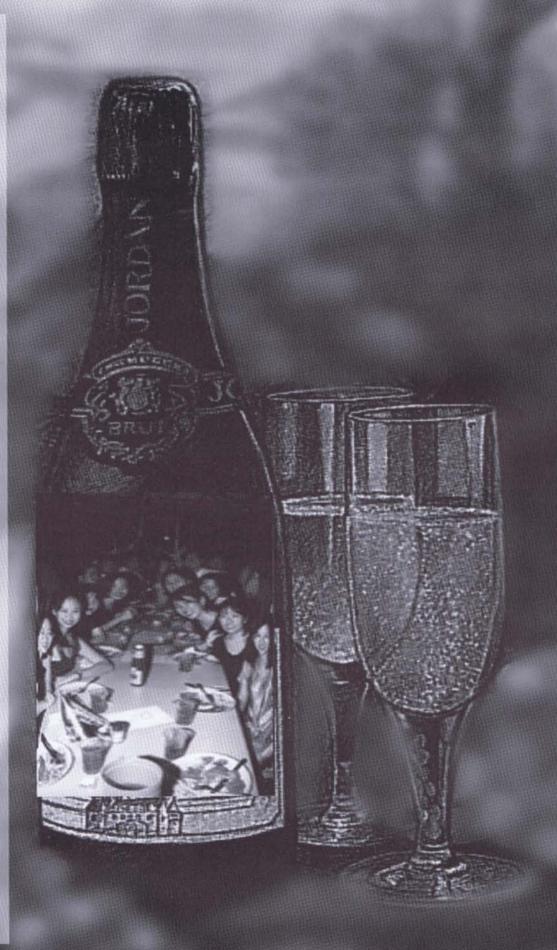
On 3 January 19%, **EXPLOSIONS** were heard in the Dining Hall. The party-popping crowd have since claimed responsibility for the incident...

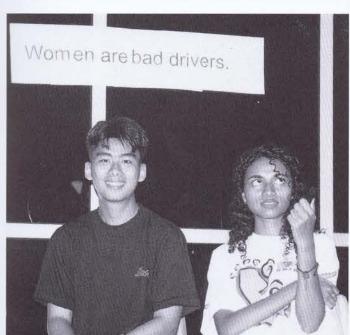


The War of the Words

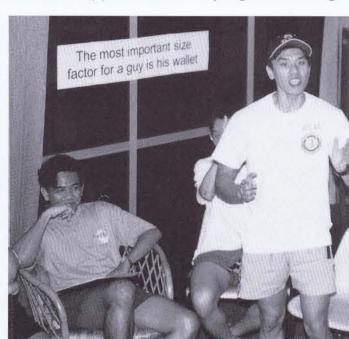

A/P Andrew Tay has been involved in hall work since 1976. He is an experienced hand at taking care of the needs of university hostelites, but what about the needs of his own little ones?

A/P Tay has two children, Aaron and Sabrina, aged six and three respectively.

Aaron was the first baby to be born in Eusoff Hall. He was born in 1989, a year after A/P Tay moved in as Master. His Chinese name bears the meaning of the hall's motto, Excellence And Harmony.

'You don't really know what it's like to be a father

until you become one, and when you become one, you wonder why you didn't have children earlier!...'

Fatherhood has been a very pleasant experience. But in today's society, there's a lot of pressure to excel, and it takes a lot of effort to bring children up. Everyone wants the best for their children, and this can be quite stressful for the children. We make it a point not to over-stress them though; we do try to provide them with opportunities, like for example Aaron is learning the piano and taking swimming lessons.

You have to love them, discipline them, play with them, encourage them and guide them in their progress. How you do that depends on how the child grows up and responds, and what the child's gifts are.

I'll play with them, like help them with sand-painting, which is their favourite hobby.

DR HOON'S LOVE TIPS

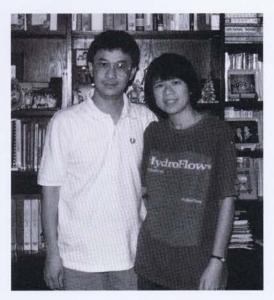

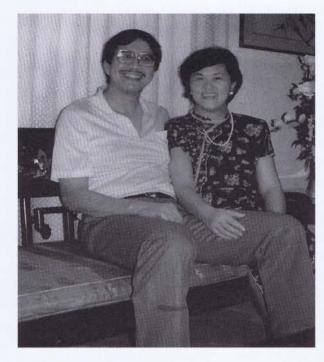
PAVRIS 'BAD COOKS'?

Be an Enlightened Social Being

In order to be successful in life, Dr. Teo feels that one has to 'do what is needed of you but not

what you want.' By looking at the broad side of things and not being self-centred, one will be able to do what is best for everything, thus, keeping the tao of things intact.

For those aspiring grassroots leaders or future Members of Parliament, Dr. Teo has this advice: 'you must be interested in listening to people complain about their state of affairs. One must attend numerous functions and social events, thus, one has to be able to sacrifice one's personal time to be there whenever the people need you ... it's a full-time job and there are no fixed office hours!'

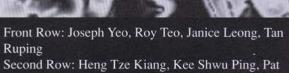

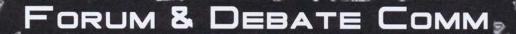

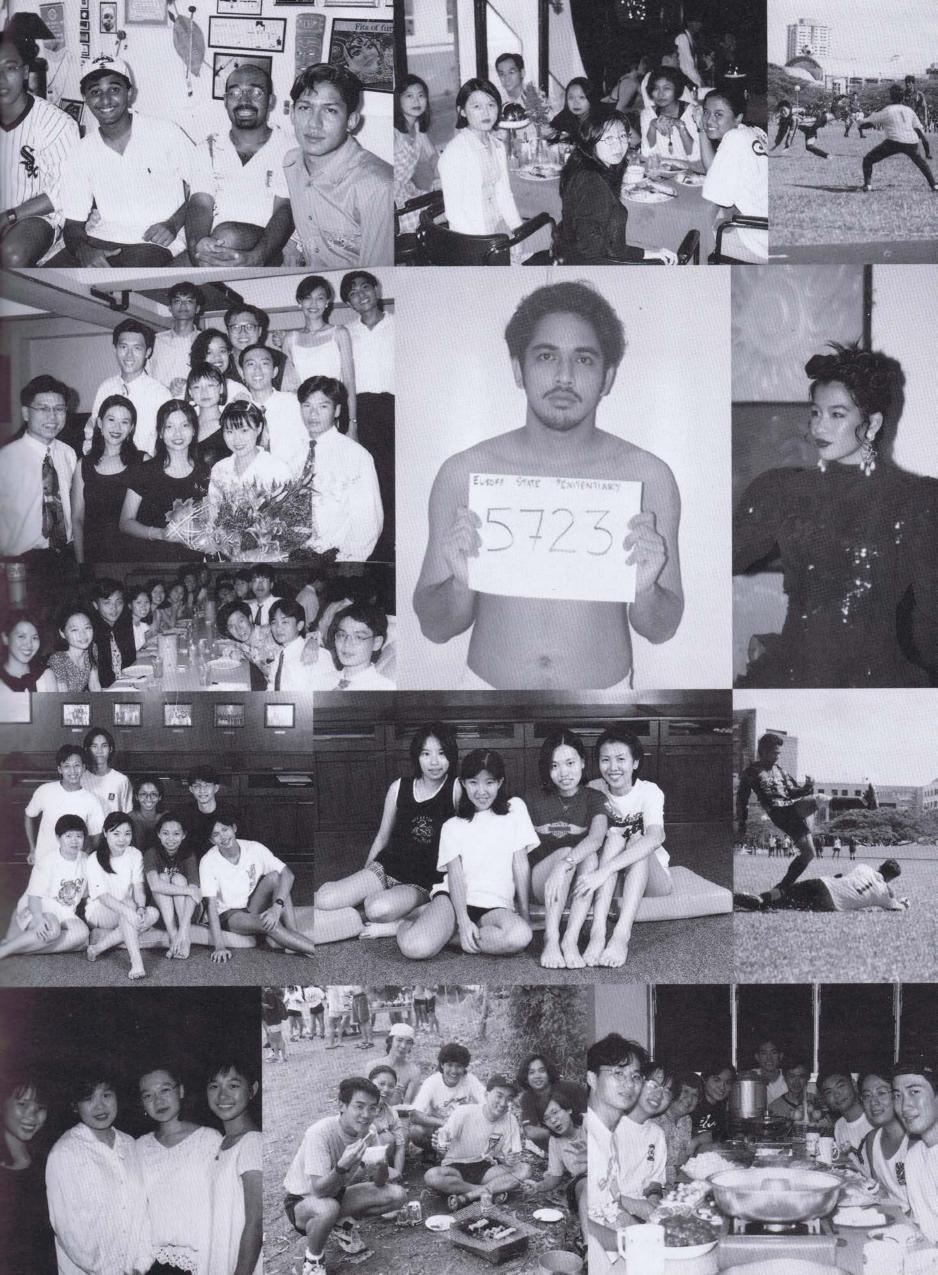












Caterer Interview

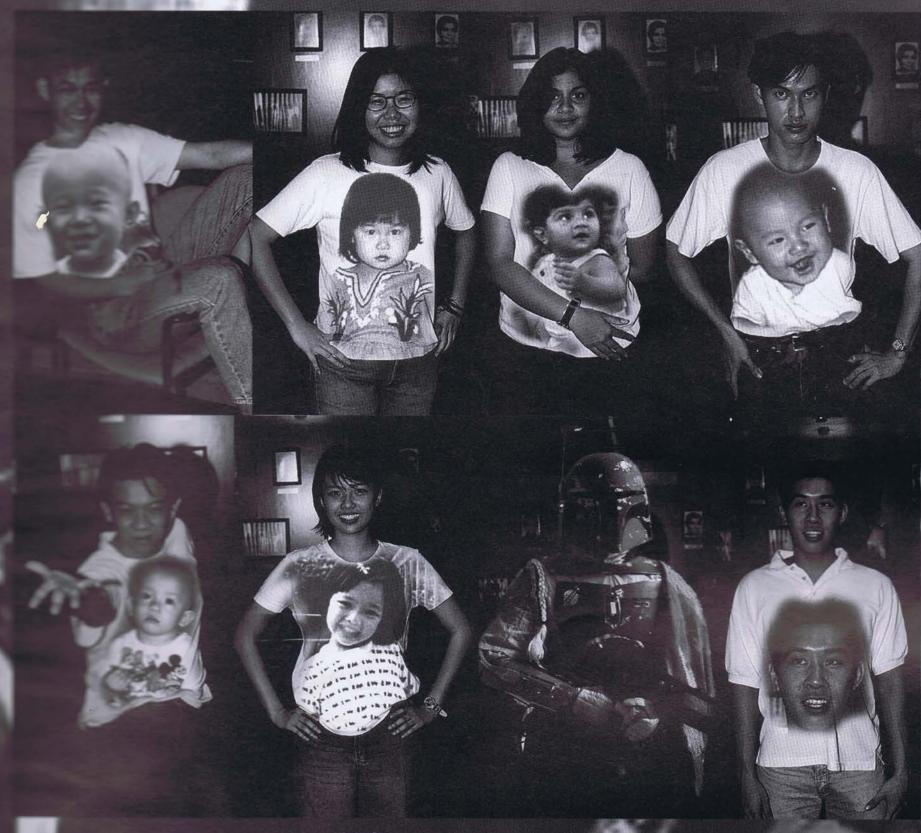
