What has it been like for you?

Not what I imagined. I thought it would be easy to put into practice all that I had in mind but in reality, the difficulty of dealing with different people, the pressure of handling everyone else's here's having to liase with Master all the time etc. broblems and

On the up side, I find that I have the authority to do a lot of things. For example, during IHG, if you find that the referee is very rude or biased, you normally can't do anything. Now I can go up to them and warn them if I feel that they are acting improperly and they will have to accept it. In this way, I can ensure hat our players are well taken care of, and not abused, etc.

Personally, I feel that everything I have wanted to do has been done and was successful, e.g. making HG one of the most important events on the Hall calendar. I think I've also learnt how to be more understand ing, to listen more and talk less, and to accept criticisms.

How heavy has the commitment been for you?

PV: Definitely heavy, but I guess I was lucky in the sense I knew what I was getting into and was prepared for it. Besides, I don't have any extra commitments outside of Hall.

So has it been worth it? PV:

It's only worth it if you go in with the right mindset. For me, I think I've done my best, achieved what I wanted to and that's enough for me. But you have to remember to study at the same time and to engage in other activities so that there's something to fall back on when you're no longer in JCRC.

Do you have any other committees in the Hall?

PV: Yes, hockey.

So how do you cope with practices?

PV: I have a very understanding captain! There's training twice a week, but if I really can't make it, I'm excused. My interest in the game keeps me going.

How do you feel towards the fact that the whole hall is affected by whatever you decide? How do you feel towards such a responsibility?

Frankly, I don't even think about it. In any case, before I make a decision, I talk to a lot of people, hear PV: their comments and take these views back to the committee. I actually have a network of people I talk to before deciding anything - the guys in the A4 wing. They are a very good support group and provide me with good advice. I want to thank them for this.

How do you deal with criticism?

PV: Well, I would speak to the person, find out what the problem is and try as far as possible to be accommodating - I mean I think that everybody's view is important and I try to make myself available to them but at the same time, I can't possibly take everyone's comments into account, especially when they are just personal ones. The interest of the Hall is still of paramount consideration.

What is the one thing you would like to see changed in the hall, and why? PV:

Actually, there are two things. Firstly, I would like to see more 'Hall togetherness'. More interaction and a friendlier atmosphere, not self-centred individuals who stay cooped up in their room. Secondly, I wish there was a way of getting people to join committees, not merely for the points, but because they feel a passion for what they do. People tend to get discouraged easily because when the points stop, they no longer want to put in the effort. Also, it's the wrong attitude to take because you are not really pursuing your interests

As President of JCRC, what do you perceive as your single most important objective? PV:

Bringing the hall together. The idea is to have fewer events of better quality so when they are good, this will encourage people to come down and support these events. Also, it's important to have fun and be together, like a family. That's what Hall life is about. We won the IHG this year, and this is a huge reward

#### Vice Presiden

What made you decide to run for JCRC?

M: Because no one else wanted to do it and because I knew that I could work with Pavi. But before that, I had no real intention of running.

@: What do you perceive your role to be?

M: The role of the Vice-President is basically to support the President. I think my role is like that of a mediator or moderator between the Hall and the JCRC. At the same time, it is a proactive role and I need to get regular updates and feedback.

@ . How do you balance your hall activities with your studies?

M: I think I've almost been able to do it. There are a lot of last minute things to attend to sometimes with respect to the Hall, and so you have to be prepared for that and somehow make up for your studies.

@: What have you achieved out of being in JCRC so far?

It is a very unique post. You have to think through a lot of things. You have to foresee the results and difficulties of your decisions and this can be quite challenging. Also, I have an interest in designing, publicity and computer-related stuff and there are avenues in JCRC for doing such things. So I get to pursue my interests at the same time. You also get to see a lot of different working styles and you get to learn a lot from them. Even if you don't personally pick up these styles, you learn how to adapt to them in different situations.

Is there a down side to all this?

M:

M:

There is very little interaction with the hall people because you're dealing with everyone on M: a professional and not personal level.

@: Are you coming back to the Hall next year, and if so what committees do you plan to join? M: Well, I am coming back but I haven't really thought about what I want to join. I will probably try and pursue my interests, like those I mentioned before.

@: Is there anything you wish to see changed in the Hall?

I find the Hall people generally quite apathetic about things going on. I would like to see Eusoffians more well-informed. Also, I think that there is still a divide between sports and culture - we should try and bridge this gap, possibly by providing more information and getting people more involved. Perhaps the block committees could play a bigger role in this.

- What made you decide to join JCRC?
- Well, actually I was co-opted. They asked me whether I was interested during the second round of elections and gave me only one night to consider! I didn't expect it at all, especially since I was the Elections Committee Head. Anyway, I thought about it and decided that it was a good chance to serve the Hall, especially since I was quite active in my first year. Also, I liked the post for I enjoy administration duties. If it were any other post, I don't think I would have taken it.
- How heavy has the commitment been for you? @:
- Heavier than I thought it would be. It's a lot different from what I expected, in the sense that J: I thought my duties would be restricted to administration matters. But I find that all of us are always involved in the decision-making of the committee as a whole.
- With reference to your character and personality, how do you think you have contributed to the particular post you are holding?
- In terms of the actual portfolio, I think my duties were fairly easy to carry out. But as a senior member, I felt I knew a lot more than some of the junior members and this made things easier. My past experience in the hall, especially since I was head of IRC last year, also helped me a great deal.
- Do you have any other commitments in and outside of the Hall?
- In the Hall, no. As for outside commitments, just the usual church, tuition, etc... 1.
- Do you find it difficult to cope and does it affect your studies? @:
- Initially, it was difficult. Being in JCRC actually entails a lot although I only have one J: committee because we are required to be present in almost all the hall functions. But after a while you get used to it and now it's not so bad.
- What kind of advice would you give someone who has difficulty balancing hall activities @ . with school?
- A lot of discipline is required. You have to accept that you can't study at normal hours and 1: are often required to work late into the night, even if you're tired. Basically you have to plan carefully and make full use of whatever free time you have. It's not impossible.
- What have you achieved out of being in the JCRC so far? @:
  - I guess I've learnt to look at things differently. In the first year, I was used to just taking instructions and executing tasks that were handed to me. But after being in JCRC, I realised that the 'people up there' have to do a lot of thinking. You also learn to think at Hall level, which is very different from individual committee level. There's also a lot of responsibility because people in the hall are affected by whatever decisions the JCRC makes. This can be intimidating but at the end of the day, it's a great challenge.
- Do you plan to come back into the hall next year, and if so what committees are you planning to join?
- Yes, of course I'll come back, especially since it's automatic for us. I haven't decided what I'm going to join - it won't be JCRC - probably things that I enjoyed and dig my first year. like Lightworks and IRC.

However managerial and glamourless the nature of the work is, it forms the core of all the activities going on in the hall. Sandi Kum, in shouldering this responsibility, deserves an appreciation for her diligence and commitment. Heading the EMC and the Finance committees, she said her committee members have to serve as a link between the committee work and the Bursar Office obligations, work with all the treasurers of the various committees, raise funds and hunt for sponsors. ② : What were your reasons for joining JCRC?

@ : What have you learnt so far?

@: What do you think makes Eusoff stand out in sports?

J: We have strong team spirit, especially this year. We are not ust fighting for the medal, but for the Hall.



Play, play, play. For five days, we did just t h a t .



a game played on Valentine's Day and might have made all the difference.


