



CULTURE NIGHT











lar evergreens. Both groups were well received by the shoppers who were clearly captivated by the harmonious voices of the performers.
































Interview with Audrey Hoo, Concert Producer 98/99.

What inspired you to take up the challenge of doing Brecht this year?

What have you learnt from doing this play?



International Relations Committee



The IRC or the International Relations Committee is a minor committee headed by Latika Sadashiv who is from the arts faculty. The committee despite being a minor one has maintained a high profile this year and put in as much effort if not more than an intermediate committee. It has taken its job seriously and has in fact achieved some measure of success despite the odds facing it.

The main objective of the committee when it first started functioning was to create a common platform for the interaction of local students with the international students, as well as to build and improve the relations between the students from different countries. It also aimed at removing prejudices of the different racial and cultural groups and lead to a better understanding of the cultures, customs and ideals of various nations.

The responsibility of initiating the international students into Singapore, NUS and Eusoffian culture also fell to the IRC once the EHOC had played its part especially as many of these students arrive too late to attend the orientation camps.

To what extent these objectives have been attained cannot be judged quantitatively but this committee has certainly left its mark.

In order to attain its aims IRC set to work actively from the beginning. They arranged to have the international student's forum every month where these students could voice their opinions regarding hall matters, express their disappointments or problems to the IRC head and to the



JCRC President Lenny Lim. Although many of the international students were and are unaware of this monthly forum it has served to bring many of the grievances to the forefront and has thus effectively played its role.

In order to increase international awareness the IRC organized the International Booths, which were set up by students from India, China, Philippines, Malaysia, Indonesia & Mauritius. These booths displayed the traditions, music, culture, and other aspects of the respective country so that others could acquire a new insight into their background.

The trips to Little India, & Malay village were received enthusiastically, so much so that arrangements for transport fell short. These trips provided a glimpse of the people of the particular race in their work & living environment.

The Saturday night movie screening was a stroke of genius. It afforded students with entertain-

ment at a time when they might have been feeling lonely as the local students return to their homes in the weekends. It also provided a reason for students from various countries to get together in the weekends and so get to know each other.

Besides these activities of the IRC, which are evident, the committee has been working behind the scenes to help the international students. One such matter that it has taken up is the points system which is the cause of much disillusionment amongst the foreign students. Our IRC along with the committees from the other halls has been trying to convince the OSA to provide the promised accommodation. It is true that they have not made much headway, but nevertheless they have tried.

Despite all its hard work this committee has not been making much headway. When asked why Latika and other committee members attribute it to a general apathy of the local students towards the international students. Some foreign students





claim that they do not receive any encouragement or friendliness from the locals. It is as if they are treated as non-persons! Whether this is due to inherent prejudice or fear is not known but it certainly prevents the Eusoff community from being a blended mix of international culture. This apathy of the local students hinders the work of IRC and leaves the foreign students feeling alienated as if they were unwanted.

This attitude needs to be changed. And Latika hopes that next year will see an improvement in the general attitude of all the students. She says, "Don't brush aside the international students as if they are non-entities. I hope the IRC had been given greater opportunity and status so the situation could be improved. It is essential if Eusoff Hall has to be a truly international hall!"



The corps has indeed come a long way since its expansion from a 18 man corps to a 49 man corps. The 2 new services have obtained positive feedback from the social workers in charge. Under the new structure, members are divided into 3 groups under 3 Service Coordinators. In additional to that a Publicity Coordinator and a Project coordinator also organize ad hoc projects such as the Social Awareness Week and the Grant A Wish Project.

We have a total of 12 old folks whom we visit weekly through out the year. Although Comm would officially close during the holidays and examination period, committed volunteers still visit them on a regular basis.

The Children Service at Cancer Children Foundation at National University Hospital was effective in our attempt to help out with the children. Distraction play during their chemo therapy session were look forward to and the ward visits where we interact with the children helped to relieve their boredom of hospital stay.

Under this service, we have organized a Children Christmas Party.

The Mentally Disabled Service at



The Social Awareness Week 1 and 2 in both semester raised awareness of the hostelites about the services adopted under EVC and encouraged them to donate to the needy in society through our pledge donation and charity drives.

The Grant A Wish project was a pioneer project with Temasek Hall. Much effort has been put in terms of write-ups of the gift recipients, publicity and the sourcing of gifts. It has met with an overwhelming response from the school population and this greatly encouraged the Corps.

Overall, 1998/99 has been a fruitful year for EVC. Special acknowledgement must be given to the volunteers whom have helped out in all the ad hoc projects in additional to their routine visits as they are not expected to receive points outside their hours of service visits.

Interview with Raymond Andrew(D& D Committee Head 98/99)

What inspired your theme for this years DnD?

We had originally wanted to opt for a theme that would be more interactive. Something like an Arabic theme or a Show-business theme where Eusoffians could dress to suit the theme. However we were a bit reluctant because we were afraid that residents wouldn't react to the theme and come dressed normally, which would have wrecked the mood of the whole night. So we eventually decided for a theme that sounded cool and which also had a meaning of sorts. "Opus X' was a great choice 'coz it sounded snazzy and it did mean something important. 'Opus' is a form of musical numerology and 'X' represented 10 years of Eusoff, coinciding with our 10th Anniversary. We were trying to say that Eusoff is a hall of many talents or instruments playing in harmony; i.e. Eusoff's 10th Symphony. We figured that even if no one understood what it meant at least it sounded cool...so what the heck! I remember that when Desmond Tan came up with it during a brainstorming session there were a couple of seconds of eerie silence!



What difficulties did you encounter for this year's DnD?

We had all sorts of problems from the word go. Due to the economic crisis we were forced to slash our budget severely. Our budget was less than half of the previous year's D&D. In the end we spent even less than that. There was a lot of negotiating with the hall administration at the outset because they were afraid that we would be unable to find enough sponsors to carry the project through. So we had to keep persuading Master that sponsorship would be forthcoming despite the poor economic situation. We were able to push the budget through because it was a modest one by any standards. I believe it was my Vice-Chair Aaron Chiew who pushed right from the start for a 'back to basics' approach. So we focused on 'good food' and 'good fun' and dropped all of the glam aspects normally associated with a D&D. We had very realistic plans and that helped. Towards the end we were very disappointed with the poor response from local residents. We expected apathy from the international students because it was something very new to them, but we never guessed for a second that the locals (especially would be just as apathetic. Luckily towards the end ticket sales increased, I can safely say that the 275 people who turned up had a whale of a time. It was simple, but a lot of fun.

Do think you have gained from your experience as DnD chair?Why?

I've gained tremendously. I will definitely have more confidence in my abilities the next time I approach a big project. Being the Chair was tricky because the Chair doesn't always get his hands dirty. His job is to coordinate and make sure that left hand knows what right hand is doing. It's kind of like the orchestra conductor...he looks like he's doing nothing, but if the orchestra plays out of tune, it's the conductor's head that goes! I've also brushed up my man-management skills. Very few people wanted to run for this committee, hence I had to resort to bringing my friends in. This came with its own problems. Remember, the D&D work term is almost a year long, so you have to run a happy ship for one year. "Discipline' was a taboo word in this committee. "Gentle coercion' was the name of the game! I'm very proud of this team. They were truly a Godsend! They held very high standards for themselves and really dug deep when I needed them to. Due to the many obstacles we met, comm spirit was strong and we were all very determined to make the event a success. And we did! The fact that we did so with so little makes my term as D&D Chair all the more special.

Any advice for the incoming committee?

Remember where D&D stands in the scheme of things in the hall...it's a hard truth. Keep the event simple. Nobody cares what grand schemes you've been cooking up in your dreams! Find out what the residents want and do that. Stay focused on what's important. If you need to burn the sails and throw cargo out to keep the boat afloat, do so!

Ups and Downs

IHG is an annual inter-hall event, held in the period January till mid-February. It is a time when six halls compete in 39 sports to fight for Men's and Ladies' title and the prestigious Overall Champion title.

Temasek was the champion for all three titles for six consecutive years, before we ousted them in the Men's and the Overall Champion titles for IHG 97/98. It was considered the most remarkable achievement for many. As an Eusoffian of that particular year, like many others, it will be one of the sweetest memories I take away from here.

Even though we didn't win the title, we knew the girls had done their best against Temasek Hall during the finals. Our only wish is that the next time round, we will be the ones bringing back the title.










Tennis - Girls


Tennis - Guys

The Eusoff soccer team was a fine blend of seniors









Table-tennis - Girls


Handball - Guys
