The eagle symbolises the indomitable spirit of all Eusoffians, as well as an indefatigable desire to attain honour and excellence in all their pursuits.


Finally, the open book symbolises the unquenchable thirst for knowledge and academic achievement which all Eusoffians seek, a conviction in keeping with the aims of the University.

An important feature of the crest is the Hall's motto *Excellence and Harmony*, which is explained below.


#### THE MOTTO



Eusoff Hall is a new hall of residence of the NUS which commenced operation in June 1988. It has been built at a

cost of about \$10 million and provides modern on-campus accomodation for 485 university students. Construction work on the new Eusoff Hall began in January 1987 at a time when construction costs were low. Consequently the budgeted funds could be stretched much further to provide top quality finishes and facilities. I wish to sincerely thank the Vice-Chancellor, Professor Lim Pin, and the Deputy Vice-Chancellor, Professor Huang Hsing Hua, for their efforts in providing Eusoffians with these magnificent buildings and facilities.

This is as it should be. My hope is that the Eusoff spirit of caring will continue to be nurtured and traditions that uphold the spirit of adventure and good fellowship will remain, whatever may be added or allowed to fade away.

We at Eusoff College wish our brothers and sisters at Eusoff Hall all the wisdom, courage and perseverance needed to live up to their fine motto "Excellence and Harmony".


years. Sweet memories are made of these!

## Highlights of Eusoff Years





1958/59

Eusoff was just stone walls and red bricks when it was built in 1958. It was to house women undergraduates under one roof. The name was somewhat of a paradox becaused it belonged to a man. Dr. Haji Mohammed Eusoff, a member of the Carr-Saunders committee, played a substantial role in the foundation of the then University of Malaya.

In November 1958, Eusoff College was officially declared open by Mrs Maude Scott, one of the earliest graduates of Raffles College. Eusoff College then became the home of 211 promising young women from Malaya, Singapore and the surrounding region.

The first principal was Dr. Ruth Wong and under her dynamic leadership, Eusoff was no longer just stone walls and red bricks. She laid the foundation - of the kind of spirit and values to be nurtured. In setting the tone for the college she stressed the importance of responsibility, self-respect, harmonious living and the dignity of womanhood.

The formation of JCRC in 1958 brought with it the organisation of social and sports activities and Eusoffians participated enthusiastically in these. Despite there being strict rules and regulations, amongst them the issuing of late-night passes (e.g. students were allowed to stay out till 11 p.m. only), there was much spirit and liveliness amongst the Eusoffians.

On 2nd February 1959, ten plucky Eusoffians initiated the first raid on Raffles Hall. With much bravado, they stormed the buildings at Nassim Road with thundering firecrackers. This sparked off the first Cracker War which was to become a traditional battle, during examination periods between Eusoffians and the boys of Raffles Hall.

Over the years, a wide variety of ammunition was used such as flour, itching powder, water hoses, balloons filled with water and newspapers filled with starch. There were carefully planned attacks and strategies for defence were worked out. Crackers and missiles would be directed at targets such as the Common Room, the President's Room and the rooms of the very popular girls on F-top. The attackers from Raffles would attempt to steal pieces of lingerie from the Eusoff laundry and sometimes they would succeed and one could then spot a piece of lingerie being held aloft as a flag to signify their "luck and pluck".

How one yearns for those days of courage and heroism.....



1968/69

It was time for reflections and celebrations in 1968/69. Eusoff had reached a milestone - it was ten years old.

Here is an excerpt of what Dr. Nalla Tan had to say of Eusoff, of what it stands for and should stand for;

"I have not been long in Eusoff College as its Principal, but I have seen within its walls, along its corridors, at every meeting place, in every stance, movement and attitude, the qualities of young womanhood which are required for the kinds of traditions that we want Eusoff to be associated with. These are the intangible qualities of honour, integrity, courage, humility and truth - truth and humility above all ........................."

The programme for the tenth anniversary celebration was spread over three days, and this included a Fancy Dress netball, other games between past and present Eusoffians, a hen party and a forum on "Woman and Tertiary Education". The highlight was of course the grand formal dinner held on the quadrangle, and the presence of the Prime Minister Mr. Lee Kuan Yew, added grandeur to the whole occasion. It may perhaps be worthwhile to recapitulate the speech made by the Prime Minister.

The Prime Minister gave two reasons why if he had to be born a girl in Asia, he would choose to be born in Singapore. Firstly, he felt that other Asian countries have patriarchal societies where male ascendency is so complete that the female is almost an atrophied social version of the male. Secondly, he felt they are polygamous societies. The situation in Singapore is different because the weight of tradition was not stifling and the fact it was a centre of communication exposed to all contemporary thinking and also because Singapore gave equal educational opportunities and equal pay.

The next point the Prime Minister stressed was that future generations would depend on the genetic quality of the next generation. He also opined that parents especially mothers played a vital role in nurturing and nourishing the child, and that a great difference is made when the mother is educated and when she is not.

With these memorable words, the grand dinner began and everyone had a wonderful evening.





1982/83

This was the year Eusoff turned 25. Naturally, it ws celebrated grandly and in style. The celebration lasted 3 days. They were attended by Eusoffians -- past and present. Many past Eusoffians attended the celebration -- some returning from Malaysia for it. One lady even came from Australia just for the reunion.

The events included the registration of past Eusoffians who attended a hen party which was enthusiastically supported by Eusoffians past and present, a mini photo exhibition of Eusoff College's history, a formal ten-course Chinese dinner and past vs. present games.

#### 1984/85

Changes swept through Eusoff College in 1984/85. A 26 year tradition was to be wiped away. What had once been an "exclusive college for young ladies" was soon to cast its great doors open to young men as well. This great change from an all female domain to a co-educational institution was naturally met with mixed response from the Eusoff girls. Indifference, shock, resentment—these were some of the reactions. Some felt it would be the end of some of their more "feminine" activities. No longer would they be able to sprawl on the carpet to watch TV. No longer would they be able to wander around in nighties. Also there would no longer be hen parties in the middle of term!

Nonetheless, Eusoff did break tradition and go co-ed. It was in keeping with the times, albeit a little late. No one could deny that for over 25 years, Eusoff had strived to build a reputation equal to any hostel on campus despite its being an all-girl affair. Yet, the change would definitely be a healthy one. Also, Eusoff could now take part in inter-hostel games such as soccer and rugby.

With Eusoff going co-ed, it meant that the student population would increase. The buildings at Nassim Road, which had formerly been Raffles Hall, was the answer to this problem.

Eusoff College was now to have 2 wings -- Evans and Nassim. The 2 buildings separated by a 3 minute walk, were to be run by the same administration. In line with the increase in population, Eusoff went Caterers. The maids could no longer cook food on such a grand scale. In addition, Eusoff was to have its first D&D that year. The theme was "Frivolace".









#### **EUSOFF HALL**

Work on the construction of the 5th and 6th halls of residence of the NUS at Kent Ridge commenced in January 1987. Soon after, it was decided that Eusoff College should move into one of these two new halls. However, the name Eusoff College was changed to Eusoff Hall to fall in line with the names of the other NUS halls of residence at Kent Ridge.

The construction of the new Eusoff Hall was completed in June 1988 and the hall commenced operation immediately. Eusoff has 345 well-designed single rooms and 70 double rooms. There are 5 residential blocks housing 97 students each. In each block, available to the students, are laundry facilities, a water cooler, telephones as well as 2 spacious, furnished common rooms cum kitchenettes equipped with cooking facilities.

One of Eusoff Hall's best features is its comprehensive in-house sports and recreational facilities. Within its premises, the Hall provides 2 squash courts, 2 all-weather tennis courts, an all-weather multi-purpose court that supports games such as basketball, volleyball and netball, and a court for sepak takraw and badminton.

There is also a large games room available that allows for all varieties of indoor activities such as billiards, carrom, darts, aerobics and board games. Other recreational facilities include a cosy lounge with a hi-fi set, a TV room with a colour TV and a video recorder, a reading room, a dance studio and a band room.

The Hall also boasts a fully air-conditioned computer room equipped with about 20 personal computers and printers for the use of residents.

#### A VISION FOR THE FUTURE






#### IN THE BEGINNING

A high point of the orientation programme was the Inter-hall Telematch, where freshmen and seniors alike cheered Eusoff......




